The Indian Ocean islands are predominantly Muslim. Even the country's national anthem declares they are "one people, one blood, one religion". Many people living on the Islands will never have access to the Bible in their own language. They remain unreached with the gospel.

But, through living and working in these communities, learning local languages and understanding culture, it is possible to develop relationships through which the gospel can be shared. This team, as they respond to both the physical and spiritual needs of the Islanders, will have great opportunities to share about Jesus's love and compassion. Working in a variety of different healthcare scenarios in one of the towns on the Indian Ocean Islands, our vision is for this team to share their lives and their faith among local communities.

We're looking for a variety of medical professionals, from doctors and nurses to those who could be involved in healthcare logistics to join this team. If you're passionate about seeing whole lives transformed by the gospel, why not get involved?

EVANGELISM IN RAMADAN

Kirsty works as a nurse in a creative access nation. She shares about her opportunities during Ramadan to speak into people's lives...

It's been an odd week in the hospital. The moon has been sighted and Ramadan is over: the relief is clear. Ramadan is an interesting but challenging time to live in a Muslim country. The increased religious activity and enthusiasm brings many opportunities to share our faith, but it's also a time of heightened spiritual oppression. According to my friends, this is the month that really counts, and they strive to earn Allah's favour through good works (and make up for their behaviour over the last eleven). The question 'are you fasting?' comes up in almost every interaction; from patient consultations to passersby in the street. Many are merely interested in whether we are physically able, or wish to show off that they are, but for some, this question has been a stepping stone to share what the Word says about what pleases God, and about salvation based on grace, not good works!

THROUGH OPEN DOORS

In my first taste of healthcare in this setting, seeing people at their weakest and most vulnerable, I have been struck by the fear, fatalism and desperation around me. I pray that small things such as a hand to squeeze or a word of encouragement would show them a God who is not distant or uncaring but who is intimately acquainted with their pain. I'm not always the best example of this; adjusting to the differences in nursing here has at times been very trying and frustrating and I've had to learn and unlearn many things. But I'm looking forward to the privilege of being able to speak into people's struggles, both medically and spiritually, as God opens doors for conversation through health.
