AMONGST THE LAARIM

Jacob Borgelt works amongst the Laarim people in South Sudan. He shares the physical challenges of getting around but the opportunities to sit and share the living hope of Jesus Christ.

EAST INTO THE HILLS

Pastor David asked if Angelo (a Laarim man) and I could join him in visiting some of the people on the eastern side of Camp 15. The trail led us through a bit of a forested area and about forty minutes later we reached a Laarim village of about 100 people. After briefly sharing a bit with them about what our purpose was in living among the Laarim, we were told that there was another settlement if we continued eastward. Pastor David said that since we have already come out so far, we should continue forward since it may be his last opportunity to see what was in the area. We pressed on for a couple more kilometers until we



finally reached the base of the hill that we needed to ascend to reach the next village. The path was steep and the hill was high so made it to the top winded. We found the village along with some beautiful views of the surrounding hills and Loryok in the distance. When we approached the village we could see children around, but they went and hid themselves after seeing us. Despite Angelo being with us, the children were probably still afraid of the white-haired Kenyan and white person who had come with him. Though most of the adults had gone down to cultivate, we did find one of the mothers who then called the children to come meet us. We sat together and David and I shared a little bit about God's word, with the help of Angelo who translated for us.

The Laarim of South Sudan live in the rugged Boya Hills. They raise cattle, and consider raiding cattle a sign of valor and honor. They have a long-standing feud with the Toposa over cattle. They are animists with some Catholic influence and communicate with their ancestors through prayers and offerings.
