

WHO WILL SHARE



Ann lives in eastern Chad in a culture where women and men can't speak freely to each other.

Ann says: "Many of the local women don't really understand their religion. The God they hear of is distant and not someone you can know. Religion to them is all about following rules. They memorise parts of the Quran and recite it, even though they don't understand it. They believe that just saying the words will bring blessing. So when women decide to follow Jesus, they don't often realise they need to grow in faith and that it is a good thing to do.

Not only that, but the local Muslim women are not used to sharing what they think in front of men. Imagine you wanted to learn more about Christ, but you weren't allowed to ask. If the women can't speak to the men, how will they hear about Jesus? That's why we need women to go and tell women about Jesus!"

PRAY for new believers to learn just how good God is and that they can draw near to him in faith.

PRAY for women like Zara to understand that it is only by knowing God that they will find true and lasting joy.

PRAY for female missionaries like Ann to help church women grow in their faith so that they can share the

gospel with their neighbours.

FACTS ABOUT
WOMEN IN AFRICA

1. HALF OF AFRICANS

About 50% of the population in Africa are female.



2. READY TO GET MARRIED?

In 2020, 1 out of 10 girls in Sub-Saharan Africa were married before they were 15.



Only a quarter of girls complete secondary school.





4. IN NEED OF JESUS

212 million women and girls haven't heard the gospel.

5. UNABLE TO READ

30% of African young people aged 15-24 cannot read or write.



MEET ZARA

"Zara is from southern Chad and understands very little French or Arabic. About 15 months ago, she accepted Christ, but I didn't see much change in her life. She didn't come to church or the women's group. I decided to do Bible studies with her. We listened to the Bible in her own language and discussed in Arabic what it says. She didn't know what being saved meant. Or that we are separated from God without Christ. But she prayed to accept Christ. Now she comes to church and to the women's group, I have seen a real change in her."



FRIENDSHIP EVANGELISM



Ministry can look very different in places where Christians can't freely speak about their faith in Jesus. Our Nigerian colleague, Deborah*, has found that those who have come to know Jesus have done so through friendship.



PATIENCE

"We met Patience*, a girl from Nigeria, when she came to work for us as a housekeeper and nanny. We were the third family she had been hired out to.

A BETTER FUTURE?

Over time, we learned she was actually a victim of human trafficking. A woman had promised Patience's relatives a better future for her in a different country. Sadly, the woman lied. She ran a business of sending poor girls from West Africa to this country. But the girls usually ended up being treated very badly.

FRIENDSHIP TO FAITH

Patience was afraid, unwell and depressed. So I decided to look out for her. I would speak kindly to her, give her small gifts and - most importantly - pray for her.

She eventually opened up to me about her life story. This gave me the opportunity to tell her about Jesus. She became a Christian and her life was transformed.

GROWING AND BACK HOME

One of the first things I did was teach her how to read the Bible by herself. It had a deep impact on her spiritual growth. Today, we are pleased that Patience is back home with her parents. She has her own sewing business and she has joined a church."

KEEPING IN TOUCH

"Marie* is a local lady who was an EFL (English as a Foreign Language) student. I taught her on her own, which meant that I could get to know her. I asked how she was and found out about her family and husband. After the classes ended, I kept in touch with her."

NOT FAR FROM FAITH

"Sometimes she invites me to restaurants, just to meet together and chat. Though I haven't told her about Jesus yet, I have already laid the foundation. I believe she isn't far from being saved."

EXPLORE CHAD

LIFE IN CHAD

The majority of Chad's population live in rural areas and grow a range of crops including rice, sorghum, peanuts, millet and cotton. Those living around Lake Chad rely on it for fish and farming, as well as using it as a watering source for their cattle and goats.

GIRLS IN CHAD

From an early age, girls cook, clean, fetch water and sweep. At 13 years old, they can be married, often to someone they don't know, who may be much older than them. School is not considered of great importance. Children may be in school for several years, but still leave before they can read. Often, girls are not sent to school even if their brothers are, and will leave school if they marry early.

PRAY FOR CHAD



Pray for Sudanese refugees who have fled their homes and are now sheltering in Chad, that God would comfort them.



Pray for peace in Sudan, and for all the mothers and children escaping to Chad to be welcomed and looked after.



Lake Chad is getting smaller every year because of global warming and this is affecting people's lives. Pray that a solution will be found to stop this.

N'DJAMENA

The capital city of Chad lies on the east bank of the Chari River, next to Cameroon. It is an important market site as it is surrounded by cotton-growing, cattle-raising and fishing areas. The city is home to the Université de N'Djamena and the Chad National Museum.

Zakouma National Park is the first of its kind in Chad. Once a target for ivory poachers and dealing with dwindling wildlife numbers. Zakouma has recently celebrated 6 years without a single recorded poached elephant and a resurgence in tourism. It is part of the Greater Zakouma Ecosystem.


MEET THE NEEM*

The Neem* are one of the largest non-Arab people groups in Chad with around 450,000 people. They live in north eastern Chad as well as in Sudan, with a language that's distinctively different from neighbouring groups. They are known to have a strong sense of identity and are resistant to change. They can also be wary of outsiders. The arrival of satellite TV, mobile phones and exposure to the outside world has challenged many of their beliefs.

WHAT DO THEY BELIEVE?

The Neem people strongly identify as Muslim although some know little of Islam's beliefs. This means their Islamic practices are mixed with traditional African religious rituals. Many of them live in fear, using amulets and charms to try and fight off evil and sickness. Many are unable to read or write, so missionaries need to be creative when it comes to teaching believers. Those deciding to follow Christ are often cut off from their Muslim family and friends.







PRAY FOR THE NEEM



Give thanks for the Neem believers who have had their eyes opened by the gospel message.



Pray for those facing opposition because of their faith, that God will strengthen and comfort them.



Pray for the team serving amongst the Neem, that God would give them wisdom in their ministry.



Pray for those who have shown interest in learning about Jesus, but are afraid to go deeper.



Ask God to raise up more workers for this mission opportunity.



Pray that Jesus would break this power of fear the people are living under, and that they would seek him rather than use amulets and charms.





AMELIA ON VOLCANO ISLAND

"Volcano Island women are loud and colourful. they run week-long weddings and love to sing. dance and argue. The matrilineal* society means women are the heart of life on the island and so they should be at the heart of any true island church. Yet it took over 15 years after I arrived before the first woman came to faith as a result of our team's ministry.

SHE SAID YES!

Aisha heard the gospel while on a neighbouring island and once back at home she shared what she has heard with her mum and younger sister. She wanted to learn more. So I asked her mum (Mama Aisha) whether we could do that as a family and – unexpectedly – she said yes!

THE REAL STORY

Every week I walked up the steep hill in the blazing sun to their house, to walk them through the big story of the Bible. There were lots of giggles and shyness as they got used to talking to God for themselves, and sharing their thoughts and ideas. We would sit behind their tin shack and sing worship songs in their own language - where the neighbours could hear us!

HAS ANYTHING CHANGED?

'What difference has following Jesus made to you?' we asked Mama Aisha. She laughed and said 'At the beginning I thought it was all just a

load of rubbish, but Amelia was stubborn, she didn't give up on us and after a while the stories began to make sense. Then one day we all decided that we wanted to follow Jesus too!'

FREE AT LAST

And Mama Aisha didn't keep what she learnt to herself; she shared those stories with a neighbour and a few months later they had the joy of being baptised together with Aisha. Mama Aisha shared how – as she came up from the water - she felt like a huge weight had lifted off of her. She was free!

GROWING AND SHARING

Of course, many challenges remain but, in it all, Mama Aisha is slowly learning how to lead her family in faith and share the good news with those around her."



DANIEL'S TIME IN MOZAMBIQUE

"Just after I turned one, our family moved to a small flat in Mozambique. It was a country that had been at war for 30 years. Life there felt normal to me. But looking back, I can see how brave it was of my Mum and Dad to go with two toddlers to a country that was still filled with landmines. The roads and almost everything else had been destroyed.

FAMILY LIFE

Dad worked with the local church. He met with the local Muslim people to tell them about Jesus. Mum's time was spent looking after us children, home schooling us and trying to get food. She also worked with women and children from the church. In Mozambican culture it would have been very difficult for a man to do that. So Mum was able to share God's love with many people who Dad could not.

MY MUM THE BUSH DOCTOR

When I was 10, we moved to a remote village on the coast of Mozambique. Here, Mum continued to reach out to the local women, teaching them how to read and write. She also learnt a new role as "bush doctor". There were no real doctors or nurses for miles and people didn't have cars to drive. So they came to our hut for help. Often mothers brought sick children. Mum would give them medicine, pray for them and share some of the comfort that Jesus brings.

REAL HELP

One lady had two-year-old twins called Maisha and

Aisha. They were weak and tiny and still looked like babies. She didn't have enough food for them. Mum gave them medicine to make them stronger and gave their mother powdered milk and food so she could feed them. Each week they came back for more milk and prayers. I don't know what happened to them in the end, but I hope Mum's help was enough for the twins to survive."





It was very hard for Muslim people to become Christians. Their family and village would reject them.

One of Dad's friends found it so hard to follow Jesus that he became a Muslim again.






Getting food was a big job because there were no shops with refrigerators. Eggs and vegetables were often bad or had maggots in them. Bags of rice were usually filled with bugs, called weevils, which had to be removed before cooking.

HAVE A GO AT CROSS-STITCH

While you sew, think of the women who attend the sewing classes at Louise's church and pray that they would know Jesus.

YOU WILL NEED:



- Tapestry needle Cross stitch mesh
- Thread the two strands through your needle, then tie a knot at the end. (Ask an adult for help if this is a bit tricky.)
- Embroidery threads Scissors
- Find the centre of the mesh and push the needle through a hole in the back of the
- Cross-stitch template (or make one up!)

- The thread then goes diagonally down to Point B.
- From the back of the mesh it comes up at Point C.



- Then diagonally across and through Point D. Well done, you've completed your first square!
- Now do the rest of the same coloured squares repeating steps 3-6.
- When you have finished with that colour, loop the thread through the back of the cross stitch and cut the rest off.

MAKE JUS DE **FRUIT**

You will find many vendors selling Jus de Fruit on street corners in Chad. It's a milkshake drink, flavoured with different fruits (this will depend on what is in season at the time) and a hint of cardamom and nutmeg.

YOU WILL NEED:

- 1 pineapple
- 10 ice cubes
- 500ml of milk
- 1/4 tsp cardamom
- 1 tbsp sugar Fnough for 7-3 glasses
- 1/8 tsp nutmeg



Peel and cut up the fruit. Ask for help
