

FROM MISSION FIELD TO MISSION FORCE

AIM'S ROLE IN MOBILISING AFRICANS FOR MISSION

When you hear about missionaries in Africa, where does your mind go? It is easy to focus on those we know from Europe, with David Livingstone a name many would recognise. But what about African missionaries and their impact on the African Church? While the name Samuel Crowther may ring a bell (the first African Anglican Bishop of West Africa), others from the 19th/20th century are lost to the history books. Many Africans played a significant part in advancing African mission but we will never hear of them. Although there isn't space to tell their stories here, we will explore how AIM is helping to encourage the African church to mobilise (prepare and send) missionaries and look at their impact in the 21st century.

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

GOD HAS ALWAYS WORKED IN AFRICA

We are living at the dawn of an emerging African mission movement. Biblical faith is perhaps the most powerful force engaging the minds and hearts of Africans today, reorganising and transforming people's lives and communities in tangible ways. In our book "Africa to the Rest", Perbi and I try to make it abundantly clear that, contrary to the popular tales, God's hand has always been upon the peoples and continent of Africa. In the formative years of Christianity, Africa was a "theological force", with early church fathers from Africa playing a critical role in grounding global Christianity in sound biblical doctrines that have carried the global Church to date! Once again, the Great I AM is on the move in Africa.

SIGNIFICANT CHANGES IN AFRICA

In the Lausanne Movement's "State of the Great Commission" report, the most common word associated with Christianity in Africa is "growth": from the numerical growth of Christianity and churches to mission agencies, missionaries, international students, diasporas, resources, Bible schools, etc. All projections convey optimism and hope. Take Bible translation, for example: between 2010 and 2024, SIL Global's expatriate workforce in Africa decreased by 20% while the African workforce increased by 70%! In addition, the leadership of all the four major translation agencies - SIL Global, United Bible Societies, Wycliffe Global Alliance, and the Word for the World - are from continental Africa.

ENCOURAGING THE MISSION MOVEMENT

Enthusiasm about the emerging mission movement out of Africa is off the charts. But how can the growth and youthfulness of African Christianity translate to a real, fruitful and transformative mission movement in our generation and beyond? I propose at least two things:



1. MATCH MISSION THEOLOGY WITH MISSION PRACTICE

Biblical Christianity and mission stand or falter on sound theology, biblical teaching and discipleship. While everyone acknowledges the dire need for discipleship in the Church in Africa, we don't seem to have the will and the determination to invest significant resources human and financial - in it. I believe we need to make the ability/skill to disciple people a prerequisite qualification for missionary candidates and enquirers and peg all ministry funding in Africa to robust discipleship training programs. We need a mission-focussed discipleship revolution in Africa! Indeed, Missio Dei is about BEING and DOING, but the current mission enterprise is too heavy on 'doing' and little on 'being'. It's time to match our mission theology with our mission practice.

2. OVERCOME RACIAL & CULTURAL BARRIERS

The Africa mission movement will flourish through kingdom partnerships built on genuine trust and hope. As they say, 'attitude leaks'; Africans still face racial obstacles, and we must work hand-in-hand to overcome these racial and cultural barriers and demolish every negative stereotype that creates doubts in the abilities of Africans to be missionaries in North Africa, Asia, Middle East and Europe. While mission strategy that links gospel workers with unreached peoples of similar/closer cultural affinity can be helpful

to determine how and where to effectively mobilise a country's missionaries, this can lead to unintended negative implications which can marginalise and have a crippling effect e.g. determining that Africans can only be missionaries among dark-skinned unreached peoples. This does not advance God's mission or motivate participation. Where is the faith and confidence in the power of the cross to both confound and save nations (Psalm 2:1-4)? God's mission is colourblind and Africa shall be a blessing among all nations.

LEAVING BEHIND A LEGACY:



In February, Moïse Baou, a pastor with Église Evangélique du Tchad (EET) for over 40 years, and director for 15 years of a missionary training college set up by the EET in partnership with AIM, was called home to the Lord. He leaves behind a legacy which will impact generations to come. Janny, a retired AIM missionary, remembers him:

We first met in Kenya shortly after Moïse and his wife, Catherine, had graduated from the AIC Missionary College in Eldoret. Six months later we met again in Chad, ready to start a brand new ministry of EET, in partnership with AIM; the first Missionary Training College in French-speaking Africa. It officially opened its doors in September 1994 and Moïse was its first director. Not only was he highly respected in the evangelical church in Chad but, over time, also in the local community of mainly Muslim people. Ba Illi, a large village where the College was built and where people of nearly 40 different people groups had settled,

was a mission field itself. As well as the trade language Arabic, Moïse spoke 11 local languages fluently, so especially on market days he could be seen chatting to traders who had often come from far away.

As well as a director and teacher, Moïse was a mentor who, over the years, saw dozens of families taking up missionary posts all over Chad, often in extremely remote and difficult to reach places. He kept in touch with them - the bush telegraph, the informal network that passes news through rural areas, was a very effective means to contact people - and former students sought his wise and fatherly counsel.

Being his close neighbour for eight years I spent many evenings with him and Catherine, sitting on our mats under the stars, talking about our hopes and dreams for the men and women we were teaching. Today, many will thank God for the influence he has had on their lives.

MOBILISING IN MOZAMBIQUE AND BEYOND

Claire is passionate about mobilising the Mozambican Church to fulfil the Great Commission. She works with local churches in central Mozambique, in the areas of discipleship, leadership development and envisioning for missions, to make disciples who will in turn make disciples.

STILL NEED TO GO

Many Christians are familiar with the command of Jesus in Matthew 28:19, "go and make disciples of all nations..." Yet today, nearly 2000 years since those words were first spoken, still 42.4% of the world's population have never even heard of Jesus¹ As a team devoted to mobilising Africans for mission, we long to see believers fulfilling the Great Commission as Jesus commanded.

TEACHING TO REACH

We began by using the Kairos Course² to help church leaders recognise that God's plan includes those beyond the four walls of the church, beyond their city and beyond even their own nation. Later we introduced the Interface seminar² to help them understand how God desires his Church to interface with and reach out to the world around them, emphasising that the privilege of knowing Christ cannot be separated from the responsibility of making him known. Every believer has a part to play in the Great Commission.

SEEING THE IMPACT

Ministry in one of the remote bush churches began with teaching literacy, discipleship, Bible study and Farming God's Way³. The group now meet every week to pray for



unreached people groups and they recently saved up an offering of 70 meticais (about 83p), to be used for Bible translation. They understand the need and, like the widow in Mark 12, out of their poverty they are giving the little they have – in this case so that others can have the Word of God in a language they understand.

Those who have been discipled there are now travelling to another village to disciple others and to pass on what they have learned.

UNDERSTANDING FOR THEMSELVES

One lady said, "Before we could read and write, we were totally dependent on the men of the church to tell us what the Bible says, and they taught us that wives must submit to their husbands. But now that we can read and write, we have seen for ourselves that the same passage also says, "Men, love your wives." They never told us it says that!" What a blessing to be able to read the Bible for themselves and at the same time, learn to handle the Word of God correctly.





RAISING UP THE NEXT GENERATION

Through the Youth Mobilization Program we have been privileged to see young people recognising that their generation has a significant role to play in fulfilling the Great Commission, and an incredible opportunity to do exactly that.



WHERE TO START?

In 2024, a Malagasy couple approached our team because God was calling them to preach the gospel to the unreached in a closed country. They poured their hearts out as they shared their missionary desire with us. But alongside their zeal was a frustration, they had no idea where to start to make their dream a reality. They needed the approval of their church, they needed financial support, and they did not know what to expect when they arrived in their new country.

BARRIERS TO MISSION

There are many limitations holding Malagasy churches back from sending people to the nations, with two very apparent barriers. The first comes from a lack of awareness of God's Great Commission for world evangelisation, and therefore there is a resistance from the Malagasy churches to lose their flock when the Holy Spirit calls them. Sadly, missionary agencies have not always played a helpful role, often supplanting churches instead of supporting them. The second barrier is financial, as Madagascar is ranked among the ten poorest countries in the world. Churches have little to support their family, let alone their pastor, let alone a missionary.

MOVING TOWARDS MOBILISING

Madagascar has a rich history of Christianity since the 19th century, and its Church has grown and established itself as the main religion on the Great Red Island. And whilst many Malagasy have gone on mission domestically, there have been very few crosscultural, overseas missionaries. Over the last two years in Madagascar, we have been on a journey of learning how to effectively mobilise people like the couple we met in 2024. To this end, AIM members working in Madagascar have created a group called the Madagascar Mobilisation Committee, which is committed to helping Malagasy churches to faithfully envision, equip, and empower long-term cross-cultural missionaries to reach the unreached with the Gospel of Christ. This new group has three primary aims.

1. Raise awareness within the Malagasy Church of the need for mission. This often starts with the local church itself, helping them to discover how they can become a more missional congregation and expand their evangelistic horizons. We have a number of collaborative partnerships with several denominations, who have granted us access to their churches so that we can train and prepare them. One pioneering denomination





has established a missions training school and invited us to teach their students, covering the topics of integral mission and missiological anthropology.

- 2. Walk alongside churches who have prospective missionaries ready to respond to God's missionary call. Our desire is that Malagasy churches will send members of their flock prayerfully, biblically and faithfully. We serve churches by helping them to rigorously assess candidates on their commitment, doctrine, and calling. Have they counted the cost? Are they known for serving well within the church? Do they require further cross-cultural experience?
- 3. Help local churches with logistics, immigration, and ongoing member care on the field so missionaries can realise their calling and flourish on the field. This is where AIM as a mission organisation comes into its own. We have the expertise and understanding that churches can lean on when they wish to send missionaries. Our hope is to bring these missionaries into AIM membership so that they can receive ongoing support and accountability.

Our team is fledgling, but passionate for God's Church in Madagascar to raise up passionate missionaries to spread his gospel for his glory. Would you pray for us that the Lord would use us in the service of his Church?



THE UNTOLD STORIES

Although Africans have been involved in missions from the earliest years of foreign missionaries bringing the gospel, very few of their stories have been told. It was from a desire to tell these stories, and to inspire the African Church to claim her place as a sending church, that the dream for AfriGO came.

AFRIGO'S JOURNEY

Inspired by former SIM international director Joshua Bogunjoko, a Nigerian, AfriGO magazine published their first issue in 2016. In 2019, AIM joined forces with SIM. To date, we've published 32 magazines covering a range of topics from "Business as Mission" to "How to reach the Muslim next door," a very pertinent topic for many Africans. We have also expanded to three other languages: Portuguese, KiSwahili and French. AfriGO is in 38 African countries now, with subscribers in 28 non-African countries!




LIMITED BY EXPECTATIONS

Across Africa, believers have reached out locally, then further, and global missions is growing. However, this has not been the story everywhere. For many African churches, the idea of sending missionaries is still a foreign concept – literally. Their expectation that foreigners should do such outreach has stifled their vision. AIM's goal is to ignite the fire of God's call to missions in every African church.

Through our stories, Africans are hearing about their rich history of missions, as well as discovering how wide and deep the African mission movement stretches. Youth are being stirred, and AIM mobilisers working to spread God's missionary vision find AfriGO

In this excerpt from AfriGO Vol 4.4, Jacob Igba, mobilisation coordinator for AIM's South African region, shares how the African Church is seeing the Lord of the harvest answer their prayers in astonishing ways.

Today, the mission field is becoming the mission force! The Church in Africa is taking her place in furthering God's global mission. But the first and important step in doing this, according to Jesus in Luke 10, is not a lot of money or a flight ticket! The first and most important step is to pray to the Lord of the harvest! He is the one who calls new workers and he commands us to join him by praying that he will send out more. Many have come to recognize God's call as other Christians prayed for them.

The Church in Africa is known as a praying church. She possesses this vital resource [prayer] needed for the advancement of God's global mission. But this resource needs to be more focused

on the advancement of God's global mission through prayer and intercession for missionaries and the unreached.

God calls some to go and some to stay, but he calls all of us to pray. He expects those who stay to evangelize locally, make disciples, send disciples and pray. Those who are sent always need a committed group of senders standing with them in prayer and providing financial support.

Through strategic, consistent and persistent prayer (Luke 11:1-10), leaders, churches, sons and daughters of Africa who are in Christ can rise and embrace this privilege and the honour of joining God in his noble quest for the worship due to him.

ANSWERED PRAYER

"I served four years in North Africa with my family as a missionary... The country was majority Muslim, with an ever-widening gap between the rich and the poor. The corrupt police defrauded taxi drivers.

"THE RESULT WAS ASTONISHING. IN THE SAME WEEK WE STARTED PRAYING...THE GOVERNMENT ORDERED THE POLICE OFF THE ROADS IMMEDIATELY AND THE CHECK-POINTS WERE REMOVED"



Sanitation was almost non-existent. Sunday was a national working day. The situation called for desperate action. So, Christian leaders prepared a comprehensive prayer list covering every possible national concern and mobilised the few evangelical churches in the capital to begin 40 days of fasting and spiritual warfare.

The result was astonishing. In the same week we started praying about the corruption of the police, the taxi drivers went on strike. Upon investigation, the government ordered the police off the roads immediately and the check-points were removed, to the relief of everyone. Also, in the week we were praying about the sanitation in the city, about 50 big refuse-collection trucks donated by Israel moved around the city clearing the refuse. Our final surprise came when the president announced the changeover to a Saturday-Sunday weekend. The country was making this change after 30 years of a Friday-Saturday weekend.

This is the power of fasting, prayer and spiritual warfare."

BEING TRAINED TO REACH

The Kairos Course shares God's heart for people of all nations and his desire to use his Church to reach them. As well as giving a thorough biblical and historical foundation of mission, it shares strategic and cultural insights for reaching out to people of other cultures. It helps us to see we all have a part in reaching the unreached of the world, whether we can go to them ourselves or not. As one participant said: "I realized I am blessed to be a blessing and so the salary I receive every month is not only for me, but I should keep aside part of it to support the work of reaching the unreached peoples."

WORKING TOGETHER

We have run the Kairos Course three times, with a mixture of church leaders and members participating. It has been very well received with participants sharing how it expanded their understanding of God's purposes in the world. After the second course, members from both cohorts started to come together each month; alternating between praying for unreached peoples and engaging in evangelism in nearby communities. In November 2024 members went out to a community for the first time. We met a group of ladies breaking stones by hand and joined in their work some of us breaking stones and others going to the river to collect more stones. After some time, they invited us to explain why we had come, and we shared how knowing Jesus changes our lives. All the ladies said they want to know Jesus more, and one shared some difficult situations within her family. She said she had been wanting to ask someone to pray for her, but she didn't know who she could ask until we came.



POWER IN SIMPLICITY

I have learnt that raising up missionaries doesn't need to be complicated. It is simply helping other believers understand God's heart for all nations and helping them to find their part in seeing the unreached reached. It can be as simple as inviting a friend to pray together for an unreached people group.



BEAUTY HIDES THE NEED

The tropical island of Madagascar is found off the east coast of Africa. It boasts rainforests and unspoilt beaches and is home to over 110 species of lemur. But it is also one of the poorest countries in sub-Saharan Africa with nearly half a million people who have yet to hear the gospel.



THE PEOPLE

With a language and culture that points to Indonesian roots, as well as the influence of Afro-Arab settlers, the Malagasy people have a unique blend of Asian and African cultural ideas, beliefs and practices that are only found on this island. Over 90% of the population is Malagasy, divided into an estimated twenty ethnic groups. However, these groups are not always clear cut, as one blends and merges into another.

HISTORY OF TURMOIL

While the people scattered across the island have had their own power struggles, they have also dealt with frequent invasions from European nations and attempts to occupy the island, culminating in the French occupation at the turn of the 20th century. Even when Madagascar became autonomous in 1958, political turmoil continued within its government. Unrest, protests and presidential impeachments have been a regular occurrence.

A DAMAGED COUNTRY

The constant upheaval of its government has left its mark on Madagascar. Changes in foreign and domestic policies between 1972 - 1975 saw a significant decline in the economy and deterioration of the country's infrastructure and social services. The country was declared bankrupt in 1982. Since then it has relied on foreign aid, which has been suspended multiple times over the years in response to the political turmoil.

A UNIQUE PLACE


Madagascar is home to many species that are found nowhere else in the world. From all the species of lemur, to the unique fossa (a cat-like mammal), to the island's national tree - the baobab - it is estimated that 5% of all known plants and animals in the world are only found here. These unique plants and animals are threatened though by the demand for wood and charcoal, which sees the forested areas of the island continue to decline.



UNDISCOVERED There is no

evidence of any indigenous people living on Madagascar prior to circa 500 AD.








BIGGER THAN YOU THINK

FOCUS ON THE ANTANKARANA



WHO ARE THE ANTANKARANA?

The Antankarana are originally of mixed Austronesian, African and Arab ancestry. They settled in the far north of Madagascar in the 12th century in a geographically isolated, rocky part of the island. This has lent them their name, which means 'People of the White Coral Rocks'. While some work as coastal fishermen, those in inland villages harvest rice, raise cattle and grow crops on a small scale. Others have moved to towns and factories for work.

WHAT DO THEY BELIEVE?

Although the Antankarana converted to Islam in the 1840s, their Islam is mixed with animistic beliefs, and taboos known as 'fady' are adhered to in daily life. A lot of these refer to the protection of wildlife and preserving the wilderness, owing to their deep connection to the environment in both the practical and spiritual sense. In response to the tangible growth of the influence of the few Christians, the local elders have called a 'fundi' – a religious teacher – to deepen and further establish the Muslim beliefs and culture in the different villages in the island.

WHAT IS BEING DONE TO REACH THEM?

There are a number of families currently serving among the Antankarana on a small island off the northwest coast of Madagascar. For the past year, there has been a handful of village people joining for Sunday gatherings with these missionaries. More intentional evangelistic approaches have progressively been introduced, such as sharing memory cards with Christian songs, and audio Scripture in Antankarana, as well as running special events on Easter and Pentecost.




PRAY FOR MADAGASCAR

- In 2022, over 75% of the population were considered to be poor. Pray that there will be relief for them, especially through foreign aid.
- After many years of political turmoil, pray that there would now be stability in the government, and that the country would recover well.
- The Global Biodiversity Framework Fund recently approved funding of \$8.56 million towards a five-year conservation project in Madagascar to help save the threatened species on the island. Pray this project will be a success in protecting God's creation.
- The island often faces cyclones and tropical storms, bringing damage to an already vulnerable infrastructure. Pray protection upon Madagascar's people as they prepare for these storms and give thanks for their resilience.



PRAY FOR THE ANTANKARANA

- Give thanks for local believers with genuine interest and faith, who will play a key role in reaching other locals.
- Give thanks that local village leaders welcome those who can support the community through healthcare, and pray wisdom for projects being planned.
- Pray that we would see Christ-centred Antankarana church communities grow in northern Madagascar.



After returning from North Africa in 2016, Megan* has been serving in the South Africa Mobilising region office (ZAMRO) to help people from southern Africa find their place in mission to North Africa.

MIGRATING MISSION

We became acutely aware that Africans were moving into the nations, largely as economic migrants and students, and a significant percentage of them were followers of Jesus. We began to explore how we could envision, equip and support these African believers who were already crossing borders for work and study purposes to live for the glory of God where he was placing them.

THE CALL FOR ALL

Although this was not a new model in missions, it required a shift in thinking. Could the professional really be part of God's strategic harvest force in the nations?

Did churches see the professional as a missionary moving into the nations needing to be commissioned, supported and prayed for by them? We realised the importance of communicating that the call to make disciples of all nations was for all - including the professional taking a job among the least reached peoples across Africa and beyond.

FROM ZAMBIA TO THE NATIONS

In 2021, the ZAMRO office hosted the Fuel Missions training online. The fruits from the course have been amazing. It opened doors to Zambian churches. Today I am mentoring and helping seven Zambians to go into the nations, with four of them going to nations where the freedom to preach the gospel is restricted. African missionaries are on the move!

OPENING EYES

One Zambian nurse, Linda*, went to volunteer at a hospital in North Africa



for 4 weeks in 2024. What a life-changing experience it was for her, but also for the local unreached peoples. One said to her: "We never knew there were Africans who are Christian." More sub-Saharan African Christians need to go to engage the African Muslims of North Africa!

EXPLORING THE OPTIONS

A young Zambian graduate, Sam*, felt the call to reach Muslims but could not go on the traditional support model. In 2022 he graduated and got himself a job in the mines in Zambia. Now almost 3 years later, he is ready to go and preparing to do a site visit to a country in North Africa later this year. He will be joined by a young Zambian couple, Len* and Yvette*, who have a strong call to reach Muslims. They reached out to me knowing we are facilitating the sending of young African professionals for the sake of the gospel into the nations.

Sam and Len will have to raise support for their first year to learn language and culture and to look for the job of God's choosing for them in that country. The challenges are huge, but God remains faithful to those he has called.

PRAYING TOGETHER

- Pray for a strong network of prayer to surround the four workers moving into North Africa and for support from their sending churches and families.
- Pray that Megan's work in South Africa will become an effective instrument to mobilise disciple-makers in the marketplace for the unreached nations.


MISSION IN ACTION


